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Course Description

Welcome to Journalism! Modern journalism is constantly evolving, especially as social media, websites, blogs and podcasts are the norm. In this course we will discuss journalistic ethics and think critically about bias in reporting. Students will be grounded in the major traditions, celebrated journalists, and professional integrity of the discipline. Quarter 1 will be an overview and survey/study of Journalism. We will cover the history of Journalism, media responsibility, ethics, reporting, and media events that have shaped our world. Quarter 2 will be used to develop an eye, nose, and ear for news. We will cover rhetoric, investigative reporting and writing, photojournalism, research, and the publication process.

ATTENDANCE

LATE WORK

If you are absent, it is your responsibility to find out what you missed and to make up the work in a timely fashion. The English Department policy is to not accept work more than 5 days following an absence. After 5 days, the grade becomes a zero. Late assignments will be penalized 10 points per day. Class projects will often require outside time and it is your responsibility to be prepared and to adhere to deadlines.

Writing assignments (final drafts), projects, or long term assignments:

The English Department policy states that late essays will be penalized *10 points for every day an assignment is late.* After five days (including weekends) the late assignment, project or presentation will *NOT* be accepted and you will receive a 0.
